Today's Epistle Colossians 3:4-11 Today's Gospel Luke 14:16-24 26th Sunday after Pentecost. Sunday of the Forebears of Christ. Venerable Daniel the Stylite (489). Synaxis of all the Martyrs in Georgia. Tone 1.

Today's Epistle Reading

Colossians 3:4-11

Brethren: When Christ our life shall appear, then you shall also appear with Him in glory. Therefore mortify your members which are upon the earth: immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire and covetousness, which is idolatry. Because of these things the wrath of God comes upon the children of disobedience. And you yourselves once walked in them when they were your life. But now put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, abusive language and filthy talk from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have put off the old nature with its practices and have put on the new nature, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its Creator. Here there is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcision nor uncircumcision, barbarian, Scythian, slave nor free, but Christ is all and in all.

Today's Gospel Reading

Luke 14:16-24

The Lord said this parable: "A certain man gave a great supper and invited many, and sent his servant at supper time to say to those who were invited, 'Come, for all things are now ready.' But they all with one accord began to make excuses. The first said to him, 'I have bought a piece of ground, and I must go and see it. I ask you to have me excused.' And another said, 'I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I am going to test them. I ask you to have me excused.' Still another said, 'I have married a wife, and therefore I cannot come.' So that servant came and reported these things to his master. Then the master of the house, being angry, said to his servant, 'Go out quickly into the streets and lanes of the city, and bring in here the poor and the maimed and the lame and the blind.' And the servant said, 'Master, it is done as you commanded, and still there is room.' Then the master said to the servant, 'Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in, that my house may be filled. For I say to you that none of those men who were invited shall taste my supper."

This Sunday's Commemoration

The Sunday that falls between December 11-17 is known as the Sunday of the Holy Forebears (or "the Holy Forefathers"). These are the ancestors of Christ according to the flesh, who lived before the Law and under the Law, especially the Patriarch Abraham, to whom God said, "In thy seed shall all of the nations of the earth be blessed" (Gen. 12:3, 22:18). On this Sunday the Epistle reading comes from St. Paul's letter to the Colossians (3:4-11) which begins with the incredible sentence: When Christ who is our life appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory. Therefore put to death your members which are on the earth: fornication, uncleanness, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. We look toward the Glorious Appearing of the Lord when He comes in glory. St. Paul told the Colossians to prepare to encounter Christ by putting their sins to death, for they are all forms of idolatry that exclude us from the holy joy of the Kingdom. The Gospel reading for this Sunday is always from Luke 14: 16-24, the Parable of the "Great Supper" which tells of those who are invited refusing to come, so the master said to the servant, 'Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in, that my house may be filled...' All are invited, but many are distracted, if not by duties (in the Parable there are the decent enough excuses of marriage, oxen and property) then by the things that St Paul lists in Colossians. Christmas, of course, is a banquet, a great feast; a celebration of our salvation in the God-Man Jesus Christ, Who in Himself united humanity with divinity, Who brings us from mortality to immortality. Here is a wake-up call for faith—a warning to not let anything come between us and Christ.
