Today's Epistle

Romans 15:1-7

Brethren, we who are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves. Let every one of you please his neighbor by doing good, for his edification. For even Christ pleased not Himself, but as it is written, "The reproaches of those who reproach thee have fallen upon me." For whatever things have been written, have been written for our instruction, that through the patience and the consolation afforded by the Scriptures we may have hope. Now the God of patience and consolation grant you to be of one mind towards one another according to Christ Jesus, that you may with one mind and one mouth glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Wherefore receive one another, even as Christ has received us to the glory of God.

Today's Gospel

Matthew 9:27-35

At that time, when Jesus departed from there, two blind men followed Him, crying out and saying, "Son of David, have mercy on us!"

And when He had come into the house, the blind men came to Him. And Jesus said to them, "Do you believe that I am able to do this?"

They said to Him, "Yes, Lord."

Then He touched their eyes, saying, "According to your faith let it be to you." And their eyes were opened. And Jesus sternly warned them, saying, "See that no one knows it." But when they had departed, they spread the news about Him in all that country.

As they went out, behold, they brought to Him a man, mute and demon-possessed. And when the demon was cast out, the mute spoke. And the multitudes marveled, saying, "It was never seen like this in Israel!"

But the Pharisees said, "He casts out demons by the ruler of the demons."

Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing every sickness and every disease among the people.

The Joy of All Who Sorrow... "with coins"

There are many beautiful old icons hanging on the walls of our cathedral. In most cases, we don't know the "story" of why a particular icon is here. But near the front of the church, on the right (South) wall, we have a beautiful image of the Theotokos "Joy of All Who Sorrow" patterned after a miraculous icon in St. Petersburg that is contemporary to the founding of our community. The Theotokos, as the most beautiful flower, stands amid the flowers of Paradise with arms outstretched beseeching her Son, depicted in clouds on high, on behalf of her suppliants who are being comforted by angels.

On July 23, 1888, the chapel in a St. Petersburg glass factory was struck by lightning and completely destroyed. The sole surviving object was an icon of the Theotokos "Joy of All Who Sorrow." The heat of the fire was great enough to fuse twelve small coins (half-kopeck pieces), fallen from a poor box, into the icon, but the image itself was untouched and subsequently credited with many documented miracles. Since then, many copies of this icon have been made with or without coins commemorating the miracle and have themselves become miraculous. The banners read, "Clothing for the naked," "Healing for the sick."
